Objectives

- 1. To research and analyze the documentation regarding the status of the following roads through Tsawwassen I.R. No. 0 and report on the findings:
 - ✓ Highway #17
 - ✓ Tsawwassen Drive
 - ✓ Pacific Drive
 - ✓ 16th Avenue
- 2. To provide evidence to help determine the legal status of the portions of the public roads passing through the Reserve.
- 3. To confirm the original location of the roads.
- 4. To indicate whether there have been any changes made to the location of the roads and, if so, how these changes were brought about.

Scope of Work

Numerous sources of information were obtained and reviewed and these sources are noted on page 18 in the *Document Index/List of Attachments (TABs)* and *Research Checklist* (TAB 31).

A review of all the Indian and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC) Regional Headquarters files in Vancouver relating to the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve was beyond the scope of this project.

Executive Summary

- ✓ Tsawwassen Indian Reserve No. 0 is a pre confederation Reserve that was allotted on December 28, 1878 by Indian Reserve Commissioner Gilbert Malcolm Sproat.
- ✓ British Columbia Order-in-council 1036 confirmed the area at 604.25 acres and transferred the administration and control of the Reserve to Canada "in trust for the use and benefit" of the Tsawwassen First Nation on July 29, 1938.

Highway #17

- ✓ Highway 17 was originally constructed (as a 2 lane highway through the Reserve) during the 1959-60 fiscal year to access the new Tsawwassen Ferry Terminal off the shore of the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve.
- ✓ Federal PCO 1961-293 dated March 2, 1961 transferred land (no description) from the Tsawwassen Reserve to the Province for the construction of Highway 17. \$11,950.00 in compensation was paid to the Tsawwassen First Nation for the transferred lands.
- ✓ Federal PCO 1979-3107 dated November 15, 1979 transferred 12.722 acres of land from the Tsawwassen Reserve to the Province for the upgrading of Highway 17 to "freeway standards". \$35,000.000 in compensation was paid to the Tsawwassen First Nation for the transferred lands.
- ✓ Highway 17 was widened to 3 lanes during the 1989-90 fiscal year (the plan to upgrade Highway 17 to "freeway standards" was reduced to a 3 lane proposal).

Tsawwassen Drive

- ✓ During the 1989-90 fiscal year the intersection of Tsawwassen Drive and Highway 17 was realigned. The portion of Tsawwassen Drive south of Highway 17 (beach access road) was constructed on a new alignment.
- ✓ Federal PCOs 1991-2414 and 1991-2415 transferred 2.984 (7.37 acres) hectares of land from the Tsawwassen Reserve to the Province for road purposes. A total of \$375,000.00 in compensation was paid to the Tsawwassen First Nation for the additional right-of-way.

Pacific Drive

- ✓ Pacific Drive is a Tsawwassen First Nation Road that is leased to the Province. Federal PCOs 1985-527 and 1985-3315 transferred the road to the Province until and including March 14, 2092.
- ✓ A municipal services agreement between the Corporation of Delta and Stahaken Developments Ltd. was signed on May 15 1985. This agreement outlines the Municipality's responsibility of providing "...the Stahaken Subdivision with Municipal services (including subdivision road maintenance) in a like manner as those services are provided to residents of the Municipality of Delta..."

16th Avenue

- ✓ 16th Avenue within the Tsawwassen Reserve was transferred to the "Municipality of Delta, on behalf of the Government of the Province of British Columbia" by federal PCO 102 of January 1, 1935.
- ✓ The Ministry of Transportation and Highways District office indicates that 16th Avenue within the Reserve is owned in fee simple by the Corporation of Delta.
- ✓ The Corporation of Delta advises that they have no municipal roads within the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve and that they provide no maintenance for 16th avenue within the Reserve.
- ✓ The Corporation of Delta was not aware if the right-of-way for 16th Avenue had been returned to the Tsawwassen First Nation or if there are plans to return it in the future.


1.0 Introduction

The Tsawwassen Indian Reserve No.0 is situated on the banks of the Strait of Georgia to the north of the international boundary. It is located just northwest of the town of Tsawwassen within the Municipality of Delta (TAB 1).

Four roads that traverse parts of the Reserve will be reviewed in this report (TAB 1):

1. Highway 17: crosses the Reserve in a southwest/northeast direction and provides access to the

Tsawwassen Ferry Terminal.



- 3. <u>Pacific Drive:</u> located near the south boundary of the Reserve providing access to residential lease lots within the Reserve.
- 4. <u>16th Avenue:</u> a road running east/west within the Reserve. It provides access to the Parkcanada camp site and the Splashdown waterslide park.

1.1 A Brief History of Tsawwassen I.R. No. 0

The Tsawwassen Indian Reserve is a very old, pre-confederation Reserve set aside in 1871 by Edward Mohun as instructed by the Assistant Commissioner of Lands and Works (TAB 2). Edward Mohun originally estimated the area of the Reserve to be approximately 400 acres (TAB 2). Indian Reserve Commissioner Gilbert Malcolm Sproat allotted the Reserve on December 28, 1878 (TAB 2). In 1881 Edward Mohun completed the official survey and plan of the Reserve and found the Reserve to be 604.25 acres in area (TAB 3).

The 1916 Report of the Royal Commission on Indian Affairs in British Columbia lists the area of the Reserve as 604.25 acres and the "Facilities of Access" as "Road and water"



(TAB 5). The British Columbia Order-in-Council 1923-911 and the Federal Privy Council Order 1924-1265¹ also list the area of the Reserve to be 604.25 acres (TAB 4).

British Columbia Order-in-Council 1036 transferred administration and control of the Reserve to Canada "in trust for the use and benefit" of the Tsawwassen First Nation on July 29, 1938 (TAB 4). The 1943 Schedule of Indian Reserves in the Dominion of Canada lists the area as 604.25 acres less a 2.49 acre Municipality of Delta road right-of-way (TAB 5). The municipal right-of-way is 16th Avenue (Brandrith Road) and is discussed in more detail later in the report.

A review of the available research sources has shown that the area of the Reserve changed in later years. The changes include the surrender and sale of a portion of the Reserve; the additions of accreted lands; and land exchanges. A summary of these changes follows:

- 1. Federal PCO 1957-499 dated April 11, 1957 accepted the surrender of 87.9 acres from the Tsawwassen Reserve to be sold. On November 28, 1957 Federal PCO 1957-1576 accepted the surrender for sale of an additional +/-seven acres adjacent to the original 87.9 acres. These lands are located in the southeast portion of the Reserve as shown on CLSR plans numbered 4444 and 4751 (TAB 6).
- 2. On August 9, 1961 Federal PCO 1961-1127 set apart as an addition to the Tsawwassen Reserve 189 acres of accreted² lands as shown on the survey plan CLSR 50823 (TAB 7).
- 3. On March 28, 1968 a total of 8.64 acres of accreted lands were "set apart for the use and benefit of the Tsawwassen Band of Indians...as an addition to Tsawwassen Indian Reserve No. 0" by Federal PCO 1968-601. The lands are shown on survey plan CLSR 53052 (TAB 8).
- 4. Federal PCO 1973-345 dated February 13, 1973 set apart as an addition to the Tsawwassen Reserve a 13 acre parcel of land shown on survey plan CLSR 57709 in exchange for a powerline right-of-way over part of the Reserve (TAB 9).
- 5. British Columbia passed Order-in-Council 1575 on May 10, 1974 transferring the administration and control of the lands shown on CLSR 57961 to Canada in trust for the use and benefit of the Tsawwassen Indian Band. The lands transferred are described as the portion of Parcel 'A' "...lying northwesterly of the northeasterly extension of the northwesterly boundary of Lot 797...". This transfer was subject to the provisions and reservations described in Form No. 3 of the schedule to the Land Act, 1970 (TAB 10). One of the provisions contained in form 3 reserved the undersurface rights to the Province. On April 23, 1981 the Province passed Order in

OIC 911 and PCO 1265 accepted the amended findings of the 1916 Royal Commission Report on Indian Affairs.

² Accreted lands are formed on the shore of a river, lake or ocean by the natural (or artificial) accumulation of sediment or by the gradual recession of water (**TAB 7**).

Council 928 under the authority of Section 27 of the Land Act. This OIC is in respect to the lands transferred by OIC 1974-1575 (TAB 10). OIC 928 transferred the administration and control of the undersurface rights to Canada in trust for the use and benefit of the Tsawwassen Indian Band (OIC 1575 previously retained these rights for the Province).

- 6. OIC 929, also passed on April 23, 1981 transferred Parcel 'B' and the portion of Parcel 'A' "...lying to the Southeast of the Northeasterly prolongation of the Northwesterly boundary of Lot 797..." to Canada in trust for the use and benefit of the Tsawwassen Indian Band. On August 19, 1981 Federal PCO 1981-2217 accepted the lands described as "the whole of Parcel 'B'...saving and excepting thereout and therefrom that portion lying within a highway right-of-way" as an addition to the Tsawwassen Reserve. These lands are shown on CLSR 57961 (TAB 10). This was in exchange for land transferred to British Columbia for public road purposes as outlined in a Band Council Resolution dated August 8, 1975 (TAB 27).
- 7. On March 23, 1994 British Columbia approved Order-in-Council 380. This OIC transferred 0.899 hectares (2.22 acres) of land within District Lots 797 and 920 to Canada for the use and benefit of the Tsawwassen Indian Band (TAB 11).

The 1992 Schedule of Indian Bands, Reserves and Settlements lists the area of the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve as 272.6 hectares (673.6 acres) (TAB 5). When the 1994 transfer of 2.22 acres is added to this figure the area totals 675.83 acres.

2.0 Highway #17 and the Tsawwassen Ferry Terminal

In 1959 the Government of British Columbia established the British Columbia Ferry Authority as a result of labour strikes at two ferry companies in 1958 which threatened to isolate Vancouver Island from the lower mainland of British Columbia (TAB 13).

The new ferry system began with a service linking southern Vancouver Island (via Swartz Bay) with Greater Vancouver (via Tsawwassen). Tsawwassen was chosen as the site for the new ferry terminal since it had the shortest sailing distance from the proposed new terminal at Swartz Bay. Tsawwassen is located on the east shore of Georgia Strait south of the Fraser River and just north of the International Boundary in Delta District Municipality (TABs 1 and 13).

The east shore of Georgia Strait is shallow at Tsawwassen; accordingly, the new terminal would have to be built offshore to reach water deep enough for the ferries. The new terminal would be connected to the shore by a two mile causeway (TABs 12 and 13). Highway 17 was built extending from the causeway through the Tsawwassen Reserve to Highway 99 (TAB 13). Using the Surveyor General reference map 92G005, the portion of Highway 17 through the Reserve measures approximately 1.5 km (0.93 miles) (TAB 14).

A letter and sketch dated November 25, 1959 from the Assistant Location Engineer to the Chief Engineer describes the "proposed road connecting the Deas Tunnel Freeway [Highway 99] and the Tsawwassen Ferry Landing". The road was composed of two sections: Section "A", ran from the Ladner interchange on Highway 99 (south of the Deas Island Tunnel) to the Ladner Trunk Road and had already been constructed, section "B" extended from the Ladner Trunk Road through the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve to the beach for a distance of 5.25 miles and had yet to be constructed (TAB 13). Annual reports indicate that Section "B" was completed during the 1960-61 fiscal year (TAB 12). The new ferry service commenced on June 15, 1960

2.1 Acquisition of the right-of-way for Highway #17 through the Tsawwassen Reserve

Negotiations were initiated in the late 1950s to acquire right-of-way through the Tsawwassen Reserve for the construction of a highway to the future Tsawwassen ferry terminal site. A letter from the Right-of-way Agent to the Indian Commissioner for British Columbia dated August 7, 1959 discussed the proposed highway construction, recommendation of compensation and the approximate area of 7.682 acres required for the proposed right-of-way determined by preliminary survey (TAB 16).

On September 10, 1959 a Band Council Resolution (BCR) approved the proposal by the Department of Highways to purchase 7.682 acres within the Tsawwassen Reserve dependant upon 16 terms and conditions³ (TAB 16). Several of the conditions listed in the September 10, 1959 BCR concerned the compensation to be paid to the Band and its members. Department of Highways "Compensation in Terms of the 'Highway Act"

- 1. To purchase 2.788 acres of Band owned land for \$5555.00
- To purchase 0.829 acres s.22 holding \$2075.00
- 3. Compensation fruit trees s.22 holding \$250.00 holding \$250.00
- 4. To purchase 0.022 acres s.22 holding \$35.00
 5. Compensation of fruit trees s.22 holding \$25.00
 6. To purchase 4.043 acres s.22 holding \$3225.00
- 6. To purchase 4.043 acres s.22 holding \$3225.00
 7. Compensation of fruit trees s.22 holding \$160.00
- 8. That payment and compensation for \$.22 property be payable to his Estate
- 9. That the Band retain 50% equity in proceeds of sale of individual holdings
- 10. That compensation for improvements be paid to individual owners in full
- 11. That merchantable timber within the right-of-way be placed aside for use of the Band members
- 12. That the Department of Highways install a domestic water pipe under the highway for connecting to s.22 outlet and to existing pipe line
- That adequate access be provided on both sides of new highway where it crosses present reserve road
- 14. That an access be provided to South portion of s.22 holding
- 15. That the Department of Highways agrees to move the home of \$.22 to a more suitable site or make compensation agreeable to \$.22
- 16. That 50% of net proceeds to Band be made available in a cash distribution to all members.

³ The 16 terms and conditions listed in the BCR are as follows:

form H-120 (no date) outlines compensation totaling \$11,950.00 that was paid to the Tsawwassen Band for the land transferred (TAB 16).

2.1.1 Federal Privy Council Order 1961-293

Federal Privy Council Order (PCO) 1961-293 dated March 2, 1961 makes reference to the September 10, 1959 BCR that listed the area required for the right-of-way as 7.682 acres. The Privy Council Order consented to the taking of the "said lands" and transferred administration and control to the Province once the Province deposited a survey of the land satisfactory to the Surveyor General of Canada (TAB 16).

Instrument number 18 in the Reserve General Register listed the area transferred to the Province as 7.682 acres and the associated plan as CLSR 56017 (TAB 14). CLSR 56017 entitled Plan and Field Notes of Power Transmission Right-of-way through the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve does not list an area for the Highway 17 right-of-way. CLSR 56017 referred to an "unregistered survey by R.J. Peck B.C.L.S. 1961" for Highway 17. The "unregistered survey" completed in 1961 entitled Plan and Field Notes of Survey of the Tsawwassen Ferry Approach Road Right of Way through the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve listed the right-of-way area as 6.516 acres (TAB 16).

The final acreage required for the right-of-way transferred in 1959 is shown on CLSR 60625 completed on March 1, 1976 by R.J. Peck for the later widening of Highway 17. The 1959 right-of-way is labeled as the "area of former Hwy right-of-way (not registered)". This plan calculates the area of the "not registered" right-of-way as 7.069 acres with a 100 foot width (TAB 27). The acreages contained in Brandrith Road and Dyke Road (Tsawwassen Drive) were not included in the 6.516 acres shown on the unregistered plan, thereby explaining the difference between the 7.069 acres on CLSR 60625 and the 6.516 acres on the unregistered plan. The 7.069 acres shown on CLSR 60625 differs from the 7.682 acres transferred by Federal PCO 1961-293 since the acreage transferred by the PCO was based on a preliminary survey.

2.2 Widening of Highway #17 to three lanes through the Tsawwassen Reserve

In the early 1970s the Ministry of Highways initiated plans to upgrade Highway 17. A letter dated December 17, 1971 from the Assistant Chief Property Negotiator to Gardom and Volrich (Tsawwassen First Nation solicitors) summarized the Ministry of Highway's plans to widen Highway 17 and upgrade it to freeway standards and to realign the intersection of Tsawwassen Drive (a private Reserve Road also known as Dyke Road) with Highway 17⁴ (TAB 17).

The portion of Highway 17 from 56th Street to Highway 99 (outside of the Reserve) was upgraded to four lanes during the 1972-73 fiscal year **(TAB 12)**. The final paving work on this section of road was completed during the 1975-76 fiscal year **(TAB 12)**. Note: the enclosures referred to in the letter were not located.

In a letter dated May 9, 1988 the Regional Manager advised the Municipality of Delta that the design for the upgrading of Highway 17 was reduced "...from freeway standards to a 3 lane proposal.". The three lanes were arranged to provide two lanes of traffic eastbound (leaving the ferry terminal) and one lane westbound (TAB 18). The reconstruction of Highway 17 from two lanes to three through the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve took place in 1989-90 (TAB 12).

A search of Gazette indexes and the database maintained by the Construction and Maintenance Branch revealed no gazette notices establishing Highway 17 through the Reserve.

2.2.1 Acquisition of additional right-of-way through the Tsawwassen Reserve

The acquisition of land required for widening Highway 17 was approved by the Tsawwassen Band Council by Resolution of August 8, 1975 provided the land was used solely for highway purposes (TAB 27). The BCR listed 9 stipulations as follows:

- 1. The right-of-way requirement will be surveyed by Highways and will be not more than the acreage shown in the plans forwarded to the Office of Gardom and Volrich under cover of December 17th, 1971, subject to the elimination of the new right-of-way in front and beyond \$.22 residence as shown on plan submitted under letter of April 18, 1975.
- 2. Highways will construct a chain link fence, not less than 6 feet in height on the outside boundary of the right-of-way on both north and south sides of Highway 17, commencing on the west side of Dyke (Band) Road and extending to the present high water mark, the remaining right-of-way through the reserve shall be fenced with standard page wire.
- 3. The Band shall receive the sum of \$35,000 without any deduction.
- 4. The Band shall receive title to all of the artificially (man-made fill) accreted land, save and except 2.104 acres more or less required for the right-of-way.
- 5. The Band shall receive title to all of the naturally accreted land, which has not been conveyed to Her Majesty to be held in trust for the use and benefit of the Tsawwassen Band, being 31 acres more or less, save and except an area of 1.427 acres more or less as a requirement for the right-of-way (total natural accretion 194 acres of which 163 acres more or less conveyed by Provincial Order-in-Council #1575/74).
- 6. Improved access on both south and north side of Highway 17 at its intersection with Dyke (Band) Road. The proposed improvement to be acceptable to the Band.
- 7. The Department of Highways will erect a light screen fence and a concrete abutment fronting the dwelling of \$.22
- 8. The right-of-way required on the north side of Highway 17 is within an area presently alienated to B.C. Hydro, hence the consent of Hydro would have to be obtained by Highways.
- 9. All of the above shall be at the total cost of the Department of Highways.

Stipulation No. 3 regarding the compensation totaling \$35,000.00 to be paid to the Tsawwassen Band; the Ministry of Highways form H-120 dated August 11, 1975 details the \$35,000.00 in compensation paid to the Band for the lands taken for highway purposes (TAB 27).

Stipulation No. 4 concerning the artificially accreted lands; British Columbia OIC 929 dated April 23, 1981 transferred Parcel "B" (artificially accreted lands) to Canada, in trust for the use and benefit of the Tsawwassen Indian Band. Federal PCO 1981-2217 accepts the lands (Parcel "B") to be set apart as an addition to the Tsawwassen Reserve (TAB 10).

Stipulation No. 5 regarding title to all of the naturally accreted land; British Columbia OIC 929 dated April 23, 1981 transferred the remainder of Parcel "A" (naturally accreted lands) described as"...that part of Parcel "A" lying to the Southeast of the Northeasterly prolongation of the Northwesterly boundary of Lot 797..." to Canada for the use and benefit of the Tsawwassen Indian Band (TAB 10).

2.2.2 Federal Privy Council Order 1979-3107

The Plan of Highway Right-of-Way through the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve District Lot 169 and Part of Lot 797 completed by R.J. Peck (CLSR 60625) was accepted on April 12, 1976 by Band Council Resolution no. 76-77/65-08 (TAB 27). This plan shows an average widening of approximately 50 feet.

Federal PCO 1979-3107 dated November 15, 1979 approved the taking of 12.722 acres of land within the Tsawwassen Reserve by the Province for highway purposes described in schedule "A" and shown on CLSR 60625. Schedule "B" described the land (Parcel "B") the Province transferred to Canada to be set apart as an addition to the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve (TAB 27). British Columbia Order-in-council 929 dated April 23, 1981 transferred Parcel "B" (the triangular parcel of land situated at the junction of the shore and the southern side of the causeway) as shown on CLSR 57961 to Canada for the use and benefit of the Tsawwassen First Nation (TAB 10). BC OIC 929 also transferred the part of Parcel "A" lying to the Southeast of the Northeasterly prolongation of the Northwesterly boundary of Lot 797 as shown on CLSR 57961 (TAB 10).

A search of Gazette indexes and the database maintained by the Construction and Maintenance Branch revealed no gazette notices related to the widening of Highway 17 through the Reserve.

⁵ Parcel "B" is comprised of approximately 12.4 acres of artificially or man-made accreted lands lying just south of the ferry causeway at the junction of the causeway and the shoreline of the Tsawwassen Reserve, as shown on CLSR 57961 (TAB 10).

3.0 Tsawwassen Drive (Dyke Road)

Tsawwassen Drive is a private Reserve road running north south near the shore of the Reserve (TAB 1). The current road is approximately 3 km long and approximately 500 meters of the road - where it intersects with Highway 17 - was transferred to the Province in 1991.

The road is shown in its pre-Highway 17 alignment on the following maps and plans:

- ✓ On the 1919 survey of Brandrith Road (16th Avenue) it is shown as a dotted line (TAB 19).
- ✓ Tsawwassen Drive is clearly shown on the **1959** Plan of Subdivision of Part of Tsawwassen Indian Reserve (CLSR 50147). On this plan it is incorrectly labeled as a "public road" (**TAB 20**).

The Province acquired additional right-of-way to carry out the following work on Tsawwassen Drive during the 1989-90 reconstruction of Highway 17 to three lanes:

- ✓ Tsawwassen Drive was realigned at Highway 17 in order to provide a better intersection alignment.
- ✓ The portion of Tsawwassen Drive south of Highway 17 was realigned in order to provide public access to the beach located along the south side of the causeway (BC Ferry Corporation property) and the proposed condominium complex, on the shore of the bay (Tsawwassen First Nation development).

This land was in addition to the 12.722 acres transferred to the Province by Federal PCO 1979-3107 for the widening of Highway 17.

The right-of-way for Tsawwassen Drive was transferred to the Province by Federal PCO's 1991-2414 and 1991-2415 dated December 5, 1991 (TAB 22). The right-of-way is shown on the key map (TAB 1), on the air photo in TAB 15, and on CLSR 73245 (TAB 22).

The Tsawwassen First Nation contributed \$41,044.88 towards upgrading the standards of the beach access road to their condominium site. The approximate construction costs for the beach access road was \$310,000.00 including the Tsawwassen First Nation contribution (TAB 21).

3.1 Acquisition of additional right-of-way for Tsawwassen Drive

On January 20, 1987 Band Council Resolution no. 577-2 was passed granting authority to the Ministry of Transportation and Highways to conduct a survey for the "... future proposed four lane Highway and overpass etc...." (TAB 28).

On March 22, 1988 Band Council Resolution (no. 57-88/577-34) was passed approving the transfer of approximately 7.468 acres of Tsawwassen Reserve land to the Province for the purpose of upgrading the intersection of Tsawwassen Drive and Highway 17 and the construction of the beach access road (TAB 29). The transfer was subject to 10 terms and conditions listed in the BCR:

- 1. That the price to be paid by the Ministry for the aforesaid transfer of lands is \$360, 000.00. The aforesaid sum shall be subject to adjustment upon determination by survey of the said lands and such adjustments shall be made at a rate of \$48, 205.00 per acre (\$119, 119.00 per hectare), provided that the net sum payable by the Ministry to the Band under this part shall not be less than \$360, 000.00. If the area as determined by survey exceeds 3.32 ha., the Band reserves the right to re-negotiate the price to be paid for all lands in excess of 3.32 ha. The location or alignment of Dyke Road (Tsawwassen Road) west of Highway 17 and the local access road may be changed or modified by the Ministry from that shown in the "Site Plan", if the ground topography or other factors in or about the location as shown would cause unreasonable road construction costs or compromise design standards or compromise safety. It is understood that design as shown in the "Site Plan" was based on minimal topography and soil investigations which were not sufficient to establish an adequate road design;
- 2. That the Ministry will carry out a legal survey of the lands to be transferred, at the Ministry's expense, said survey to be to the satisfaction of the Tsawwassen Band Council and the Department of Indian Affairs and, once this survey has been so approved, it will be substituted for the legal description aforesaid;
- 3. That all the road work shown outlined in red on the "Site Plan" contained in the Burgess, Austin Report of August 18, 1987 will be constructed by the Ministry, at the Ministry's expense, to include the construction of a local access road to the causeway beach also shown on the said Ministry plans;
- 4. That the Ministry will endeavour to reduce the width of taking for the access road (shown on the aforesaid "Site Plan" as 15 metres) but, in the event that the reduced width does not afford sufficient area for roadway drainage purposes, the Band will be responsible for looking after drainage. The Ministry may install equalization culverts along the local access road. In the event that more than 15m width is required to contain the roadway fill slopes, the consideration, said slope easement to endure until such time as the elevation of the adjacent lands has been raised sufficiently to result in the toe of the roadway fill slopes being contained entirely within the local access road right-of-way, at which time the total width of the R/W used by the Ministry shall not exceed 15 metres;

- 5. That the Band, for its general purposed and, more specifically, for its proposed Marina development, will continue to use the temporary access until the proposed subject road works are constructed;
- That, subject to condition 7 below, the Band will be responsible to settle all claims from any Band locatee affected by the proposed right-of-way and any subsequent works of the Ministry;
- 7. That in consideration of the Band's agreement to demolish the house located within the proposed right-of-way on or before June 30, 1988, the Ministry will pay an additional \$15, 000.00 in compensation;
- 8. That within 6 weeks of delivery of a signed Band Council Resolution to the Ministry, the total compensation funds in the sum of \$375, 000.00 will be paid to the Band's Solicitors, Messrs. Snarch & Allen, in trust. The Ministry will make its best efforts to pay the funds to the Band's Solicitor as soon as possible after receipt of the signed Band Council Resolution. The Band Council Resolution shall be approved by the Indian and Northern Affairs Canada Approving Officer;
- 9. All trust funds held by the Band's solicitors shall be invested in a term deposit at one of the five major Canadian banks, with all interest earned on the said term deposit accruing to the account of our Band. The sum of \$15,000.00 shall be held in trust until such time as the Ministry has received the following:
 - i. A release of claim executed by the locatee affected,
 - ii. A release of claim executed by the Band Council, and
 - iii. Confirmation that the house has been demolished.

All remaining funds, including the accrued interest, are to be held in trust until such time as the Order-in-Council transferring the said lands to the Provincial Government has been granted by the Federal Government;

10. The lands to be transferred located north of Highway 17 are within an area presently alienated to B.C. Hydro, hence the consent of B.C. Hydro is required. The obtaining of this consent by the Ministry shall not delay the payment of funds as aforesaid.

Stipulations 1 and 7 regarding compensation paid to the Band and demolition of a Reserve house; form H-120 dated April 11, 1988 summarizes the total of \$375,000.00 of compensation paid by the Province to the Tsawwassen Band; \$15,000.00 was paid for a small Reserve house and \$360,000.00 was paid for subdivided lands (TAB 29).

Further to BCRs dated March 22, 1988 and March 7, 1989 a BCR was signed by the band on March 8, 1989 agreeing to demolish the house by June 1, 1989. A "Memo to file" dated June 6, 1989 indicated that the house was demolished on May 31, 1989.

Stipulation 2 regarding the legal survey to be completed by the Ministry of Transportation of the lands to be transferred; the descriptions of the lands to be transferred (points 1 and 2 of the March 22 BCR) were later amended by a BCR dated March 7, 1989. This description is based on the preliminary survey plan completed by Grant Butler B.C.L.S. on January 3, 1989 (TAB 29). This description was later amended when the road was realigned to avoid archaeological sites. Survey plan CLSR 73245 shows the right-of-way that was transferred to the Province for the widening of

Highway 17 to accommodate the realigned intersection and the section of Tsawwassen Drive which runs south of Highway 17 to the beach (TAB 22).

A BCR dated March 8, 1989 granted immediate permission to the Province to enter onto the lands to be transferred for the purpose of construction and onto Band lands for the purpose of connecting driveways (TAB 30).

Four "Release of Claim" forms dated March 7 and 8, 1989 were passed (pursuant to BCRs dated March 22, 1988 and March 7, 1989) by the Tsawwassen Chief and Council and locatees transferring lands from the Tsawwassen Indian Band to the Province for road purposes (TAB 29).

3.2 Reconstruction of Tsawwassen Drive/Highway #17 Intersection and the construction of the beach access road (Tsawwassen Drive)

The reconstruction of the Tsawwassen Drive/Highway 17 intersection and the construction of the beach access road took place during the 1989-90 fiscal year at the same time as the widening of Highway 17 to 3 lanes (TAB 12). The alignment of the beach access road was changed or amended three times during its construction. Two of these realignments resulted from the discovery of archeological sites within the road right-of-way. The other change was requested by the Tsawwassen First Nation in order to improve traffic flow and public safety. A number of Band Council Resolutions and "Release of Claim" forms related to the changes in alignment were passed by the Tsawwassen Indian Band. The requested changes and associated documents are summarized in chronological order below:

1. During construction of the beach access road a burial ground was discovered. The alignment of the road was changed to avoid the site. The following BCRs and "release of claim" forms were passed by the Tsawwassen Indian Band approving this alignment change:

June 27, 1989

BCR signed by the Chief and Council approving the realignment of the beach access road to avoid the existing burial grounds (TAB 23).

July 5, 1989

In a letter to Snarch and Allen (Tsawwassen First Nation lawyers) dated July 5, 1989 the Regional Project Manager (MoTH) requested changes to be made to the wording of the June 27, 1989 BCR. MoTH also requested release of claim forms from the Band Council and all the locatees affected by the changes to the beach access road alignment (TAB 23).

July 11, 1989

This BCR incorporated the amendments requested by MoTH in the July 5, 1989 letter. The changes amend the land descriptions stated in the previous BCRs dated March 22, 1988 and March 7, 1989 (TAB 23).

A "Release of claim" form signed by '\$.22 transferred lands from the Tsawwassen IR to the province for road purposes (TAB 23).

August 29, 1989

BCR passed stating "in order to have the alignment of the beach access road avoid the midden site, the Tsawwassen Indian Band agrees to indemnify and save harmless the Province of British Columbia against any claim..." brought forth by band locatees affected by the realignment (TAB 23).

A "Release of Claim" form signed by the Chief and Council transferred land from the Tsawwassen Reserve to the Province for road purposes (TAB 23).

2. A further alignment change was requested by the Tsawwassen Band in order to "improve traffic flow and enhance public safety":

July 27, 1989

BCR requested "the Ministry [to] change the alignment of the proposed beach access road to improve traffic flow and enhance public safety" and amend the land descriptions stated in the previous BCRs dated March 22, 1988 and March 7, 1989 (TAB 24).

A BCR, also dated July 27, 1989, granted to MoTH a 1.5 meter (4.9 feet) working easement on either side of the proposed beach access road right-of-way (TAB 24).

Two "Release of claim" forms, one signed by the Chief and Council and the other signed by \$.22 accompany the BCR and transfer lands from the Tsawwassen Indian Band to the Province for the purpose of "... construction improvements to Highway 17, [and] constructing a beach access road..." (TAB 24).

August 29, 1989

A BCR was passed confirming the realignment of the access road. This BCR contained a plan showing the desired route and replaced the plan attached to the BCR dated July 27, 1989 (TAB 24).

3. The alignment was modified a third time in order of avoid another midden site that was discovered.

December 13, 1989

A BCR was passed choosing "option #2" for the realignment of the access road to avoid a midden site. This alignment is further to the alignments described in the BCRs dated July 27 and August 29 (TAB 25).

December 15, 1989

Two "Release of Claim" forms, one signed by the Chief and Council and the other signed by s.22 transferring land from the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve to the Province for road purposes (TAB 25).

The final alignment is shown on CLSR 73245 (TAB 22). Measuring from CLSR 73245 the reconstructed intersection of Tsawwassen Drive and Highway 17 is approximately 110 meters wide, the beach access road is approximately 450 meters long and 12.5 meters wide.

3.3 Federal Privy Council Orders 1991-2414 and 1991-2415

Two Federal PCO's were passed on December 5, 1991 transferring the right-of-way for the beach access road and the Highway 17/Tsawwassen Drive intersection to the Province. The first, 1991-2414 was passed pursuant to section 35(1) of the *Indian Act*. This order consented to the "exercise... of the Province of British Columbia of the power to take without the consent of the owner, the Lands which are in Tsawwassen Indian Reserve No. 0 only for as long as the Lands are used for highway purposes or other works of public utility" subject to a number of terms ⁶. The 2.984 hectares (7.37 acres) of land are shown on CLSR 73245 (TAB 22).

The second PCO, 1991-2415, consists of two parts: Part (a) pursuant to section 35(3) of the *Indian Act*, in lieu of the Province of British Columbia taking certain lands without

- That the Lands shall be used for highway purposes or other works of public utility and for no other purpose;
- b. That the exception of mines and minerals referred to in the schedule hereto shall include the right to explore for, develop, produce and extract minerals provided always that the exercise of this right shall not interfere in any way with the uninterrupted enjoyment of the Lands of and by Her Majesty in right of the Province of British Columbia or the public or the right of Her Majesty to construct (including all necessary excavations), improve, operate, maintain or use the Lands, nor shall any development, production or extraction of the minerals injure the surface or the support of the surface of the Lands;
- c. That is the Lands or a part thereof cease to be used for highway purposes or other works of public utility, the administration and control of the Lands or part thereof shall be returned to Her majesty in right of Canada for the use and benefit of the Tsawwassen Indian Band at no cost and subject to the same terms as those of Provincial Order in Council 1036 of July 29, 1938 amended by Provincial Order in Council 155 of May 13, 1969 as if those Lands had been included within Provincial Order in Council 1036;
- d. That Her Majesty in right of British Columbia shall pay to the Receiver General for Canada compensation in the amount of \$360, 000.00 for the use and benefit of the Tsawwassen Band of Indians; and
- e. That Her Majesty in right of Canada accepts the compensation payable pursuant to paragraph (d) as full and final satisfaction to Her Majesty in right of Canada and the Tsawwassen Band of Indians for the compulsory taking of the Lands by Her Majesty in right of the Province of British Columbia pursuant to this Order.

⁶ The following are the terms listed in PCOs 1991-2414 and 1991-2415:

the consent of the owner, authorizes the transfer of the lands subject to a number of terms (same terms included in PCO 1991-2414). Part (b) pursuant to section 4(2) of the *Public Lands Grants Act* transferred the lands to the Province for so long as they are used for highway purposes or other works of public utility (TAB 22).

4.0 Pacific Drive

Pacific Drive is located within the southern portion of the Reserve. It extends from Pacific Drive (located outside of and south west of the Reserve) to 48th Street (east of the Reserve) (TAB 1). It serves residential lease lots adjacent to neighbourhoods located within the town of Tsawwassen.

In a letter dated December 20, 1982, to Zaruby and Grimson (Barristers and Solicitors), the Advisor, Indian Land Matters (Ministry of Lands, Parks and Housing) discusses the drafting of a Provincial order-in-council for the purpose of transferring the subdivision roads to the province for a term of 107 years beginning on December 8, 1980. This letter also mentions an agreement regarding the provision and maintenance of services within the subdivision by the Municipality of Delta for Stahaken Developments Ltd. (the final agreement is dated May 15, 1985) (TAB 26). A January 4, 1983 memo from the Senior Property Negotiator (attached to the December 20, 1982 letter) discusses how the Department of Indian Affairs does not "recognize Municipal authority within Indian Reserves" and how it would be "likely that we [MoTH] will be asked by DIA if we will accept this road on their behalf" (TAB 26).

British Columbia OIC 1071 dated June 13, 1984 transferred the portion of Pacific Drive shown on subdivision plan CLSR 68397 to the Province for a term concluding on December 7, 2087. At this time the administration, control and benefit of the road automatically reverts to Canada (TAB 26). The surrenders that this OIC is based on were later revoked by Federal PCO 1985-527 (TAB 26). A search of the Order in Council Administration office reveals that there is no record of OIC 1071 being amended to reflect this.

Federal PCO 1985-527 transferred the portion of Pacific Drive (described in Part I of the schedule) shown on CLSR 68397 to British Columbia for roadway purposes until and including March 14, 2092. After this date the administration and control of the road will be returned to Canada (TAB 26).

A municipal services agreement between Stahaken Developments Ltd. and the Municipality of Delta was signed on May 15, 1985. This agreement describes how Stahaken Developments Ltd. will provide and construct "said works" within the subdivision and how the Municipality will "provide the Stahaken Subdivision with Municipal services in a like manner as those services are provided to residents of the Municipality of Delta..." (TAB 26). During an August 10, 1999 telephone conversation placed with the Corporation of Delta, the Transportation Manager reported that the municipality extends their minor road maintenance programs (snow removal, sanding,

line painting and patching) over this road when the same work is carried out on the adjacent roads.

The portion of Pacific Drive shown on right-of-way plan CLSR 69638 was transferred to the Province by Federal PCO 1985-3315 Dated November 7, 1985 for a term expiring on March 14, 2092. The administration, control and benefit of the road automatically reverts to Canada on this date (TAB 26). British Columbia OIC 1987-1328 (later amended by OIC 1987-1626) refers to Federal PCO 1985-3315. It orders that the operation of subsection 107 (1) of the Land Title Act be limited with respect to the subdivision road so that the administration, control and benefit of the subdivision road automatically reverts to Canada on March 14, 2092 (TAB 26).

5.0 16th Avenue (Brandrith Road)

The original alignment of 16th Avenue (also known as Brandrith Road) is shown on the following maps and plans:

- ✓ June 13, 1919 plan entitled "Plan of a 2.49 Acre Portion of the Tsawwassen I.R..." (TAB 19). It extended from Tsawwassen Drive to the modern day 52nd Street.
- ✓ 16th Avenue is clearly shown on the *Plan of Subdivision of Part of Tsawwassen Indian Reserve* (CLSR 50147 completed in **1959**) (TAB 20).
- ✓ A letter and sketch dated November 25, 1959 from the Assistant Location Engineer also shows this alignment and how it was bisected by the proposed alignment of Highway 17 (TAB 13).

Currently 16th Avenue serves the Parkcanada RV park and campground and the Splashdown waterslide park located within the Reserve (**TAB 1**). CLSR 60625 shows how access to 16th Avenue within the Reserve is provided from Nulelum Way (a road running parallel along Highway 17) and a short section of private road within the Reserve (**TAB 27**). The directions given in an Internet advertisement for the Parkcanada campground also describes the roads traveled to access the park (**TAB 15**).

The portion of 16th Avenue within the Reserve was transferred to the "Municipality of Delta, on behalf of the Government of the Province of British Columbia" by Federal PCO 102 dated January 1, 1935 (TAB 19). A 66 foot road right-of-way totaling 2.49 acres was transferred to the Municipality in exchange for the construction and maintenance of the road, ditch and flood box. This is the same right-of-way noted in the 1943 Schedule of Indian Reserves in the Dominion of Canada (TAB 5).

The Supervisor of Planning and Development for the Ministry of Transportation and Highways states that "16th Ave west of Hwy 17 is owned in fee simple by Delta" (TAB 15). However, during an August 10, 1999 telephone conversation the Transportation Manager for the Corporation of Delta states that they have no municipal roads within the Tsawwassen Reserve and that 16th Avenue is a private road. The

Corporation of Delta provides no maintenance for 16th Avenue. The Transportation Manager is not aware if the right-of-way for 16th Avenue has been returned to the Tsawwassen First Nation or if there are plans to return it in the future.

6.0 Conclusions

- ✓ Tsawwassen Indian Reserve No. 0 is a pre confederation Reserve that was allotted on December 28, 1878 by Indian Reserve Commissioner Gilbert Malcolm Sproat.
- ✓ British Columbia Order-in-council 1036 confirmed the area at 604.25 acres and transferred the administration and control of the Reserve to Canada "in trust for the use and benefit" of the Tsawwassen First Nation on July 29, 1938.

6.1 Highway #17

- ✓ Highway 17 was originally constructed (as a 2 lane highway through the Reserve) during the 1959-60 fiscal year to access the new Tsawwassen Ferry Terminal off the shore of the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve.
- ✓ Federal PCO 1961-293 dated March 2, 1961 transferred land (no description) from the Tsawwassen Reserve to the Province for the construction of Highway 17. \$11,950.00 in compensation was paid to the Tsawwassen First Nation for the transferred lands.
- ✓ Federal PCO 1979-3107 dated November 15, 1979 transferred 12.722 acres of land from the Tsawwassen Reserve to the Province for the upgrading of Highway 17 to "freeway standards". \$35,000.000 in compensation was paid to the Tsawwassen First Nation for the transferred lands.
- ✓ Highway 17 was widened to 3 lanes during the 1989-90 fiscal year (the plan to upgrade Highway 17 to "freeway standards" was reduced to a 3 lane proposal).

6.2 Tsawwassen Drive

- ✓ During the 1989-90 fiscal year the intersection of Tsawwassen Drive and Highway 17 was realigned. The portion of Tsawwassen Drive south of Highway 17 (beach access road) was constructed on a new alignment.
- ✓ Federal PCOs 1991-2414 and 1991-2415 transferred 2.984 (7.37 acres) hectares of land from the Tsawwassen Reserve to the Province for road purposes. A total of \$375,000.00 in compensation was paid to the Tsawwassen First Nation for the additional right-of-way.

6.3 Pacific Drive

- ✓ Pacific Drive is a Tsawwassen First Nation Road that is leased to the Province. Federal PCOs 1985-527 and 1985-3315 transferred the road to the Province until and including March 14, 2092.
- ✓ A municipal services agreement between the Corporation of Delta and Stahaken Developments Ltd. was signed on May 15 1985. This agreement outlines the Municipality's responsibility of providing "...the Stahaken Subdivision with Municipal services (including subdivision road maintenance) in a like manner as those services are provided to residents of the Municipality of Delta..."

6.4 16th Avenue

- ✓ 16th Avenue within the Tsawwassen Reserve was transferred to the "Municipality of Delta, on behalf of the Government of the Province of British Columbia" by federal PCO 102 of January 1, 1935.
- ✓ The Ministry of Transportation and Highways District office indicates that 16th Avenue within the Reserve is owned in fee simple by the Corporation of Delta.
- ✓ The Corporation of Delta advises that they have no municipal roads within the Tsawwassen Indian Reserve and that they provide no maintenance for 16th avenue within the Reserve.
- ✓ The Corporation of Delta was not aware if the right-of-way for 16th Avenue was returned to the Tsawwassen First Nation or if there are plans to return it in the future.



The 1880 acres included in the Chilliwack Reserves were set apart and definied by Mr.J.B.Landers in 1868, under instructions from the Chief Commissioner (See page 54 of the Yellow Book)

The Reserve at Burrard Inlet now known as Squamish No.2. was set aside in 1869 as containing 147 acres.

The Tsawassen Reserve was reported on the 9th June 1871 (page 93 Yellow Book) by Mr Edward Mohun as set aside under instructions from the Provincial Chief Commissioner of Lands and Works. It was set aside because the Indians' occupancy had been long recognised. Its area as then estimated was roughly stated at 400 acres. When afterwards surveyed the tract was found to contain 604.25 acres.


The 100 acres described in this schedule is comprised in the "one lot opposite New Westminster" described in Mr Trutch's membrandum of the 28th August 1867 as being one of the reserves surveyed under Col. Moody before he left the Colony.


In the schedule transmitted to the Dominion Government in 1871, Katzie is described as on the left bank of the Fraser River and containing 108 acres. This must be a mistake. The reserve known as Katzie No.1. containing 109 acres is on the right bank and nearly opposite. The reserve known as Katzie No.2 is the reserve containing 58 acres, which is mentioned in Mr Trutch' list of December 1868, and described as " on the left bank of the Fraser and nearly opposite Katzie village. The memorandum of the Chief Commissioner of the 28th August 1867 gives as reserves "two lots at Katsie, one on each side of the river". It is safe to conclude that both of the Katzie reserves were constituted before the Union.


The reserve known as Langley No.5. is not included in the Schedule. It was, however, as will be seen on reference to the Report of the Chief Commissioner of Lands and Works of the 28th August 1867, page 4, Yellow Book, set in April 1864 and its area was then given as 353 acres. When this reserve was surveyed

surveyed in 1880 it was found to contain 360.50 acres, which is its constituted area today.


The schedule embraces two reserves on Coquitlam River of a 18.40 and 6.50 acres respectively. On reference to page 26. Yellow Book, it will be found that a reserve on Coquitlam River is referred to as "not exceeding 50 acres". There is no record of its being reduced. Governor Douglas on the 27th April 1863 gave instructions to have "the existing reserve extended in conformity with the wishes of the natives". The reserve referred was evidently that described in the Schedule as containing on; y 18.40 acres, for the other reservve, therein described, comprises nearest with the original area 6.50 acres. It seems that in accordance with the Governords instructions the larger reserve was extended to 202,50 acres, the present area, for Commissioner Sproat in 1879 simply recorded his confirmation of the old reserve found to contain 202.50 The acreage therefore to be added to the acres. Achedule in respect of reserves in this Agency is 3442.85 acres.

THAT by memorandum of agreement bearing date the 24th day of September 1912 made between J. A. J. McKenna, Special Commissioner appointed by the Dominion Government to investigate the condition of Indian affairs in British Columbia, and the Honourable Sir Richard McBride as Premier of the Province of British Columbia, an agreement was arrived at subject to the approval of the Governments of the Dominion and of the Province, for the purpose of settling all differences between the said Governments respecting Indian lends and Indian affairs generally in the Province of British Columbia, and for the final adjustment of all matters relating thereto, by the appointment of a commissioner for the purposes set out in the agreement.

THAT by Dominion Order in Council of the 27th November 1912, and Provincial Order in Council of the 31st day of December 1912, the said agreement was approved, subject to the further provision that not with standing anything in the said agreement contained, the Acts and proceedings of the Commission shell be subject to the approval of the two Governments and that the Governments agree to consider favourably the reports whether final or interim, of the Commission, with a view to give effect as far as reasonably may be to the Acts, proceedings and recommendations of the Commission and to take all such steps and proceedings as may be reasonably necessary with the object of carrying into execution the settlement provided for by the Agreement in accordance with its true intent and purpose.

THAT a Royal Commission on Indian Affairs for the Province of British Columbia was duly appointed for the purpose of carrying out the said Agreement.

THAT the said Commission has since reported as to lands reserved and to be reserved for Indians in the Province of British Columbia, and otherwise for the settling of all differences between the said Governments respecting Indian lands and Indian Affairs generally in the said Province.

THAT by Chapter 32 of the Statutes of British Columbia 1919, entitled "Indian Affairs Settlement Act" the Lieutenent Governor in Council was empowered to do, execute and fulfill

THAT the said representatives have reported in respect to their adjustment, readjustment and review of the said report:

AND TO RECCLIEND:

THAT the Report of the Royal Commission of Indian Affairs as made under date of the 30th day of June 1916, with the amenaments thereto as made by the representatives of the two Governments, viz: Mr. W. E. Ditchburn, representing the Dominion Government and Major J. W. Clark, representing the Province, in so far as it covers the adjustments, readjustments or confirmation of the Reductions, Cut-offs and additions in respect of Indian Reserves proposed in the said report of the Royal Commission, as set out in the annexed schedules, be approved and confirmed as constituting full and final adjustment and settlement of all differences in respect thereto between the Governments of the Dominion and the Province, in fulfilment of the said Agreement of the 24th day of September 1912, and also of Section 13 of the Terms of Union, except in respect to the provision for lands for Indians resident in that portion of British Columbia covered by Treaty No. 8, which forms the subject of Interim Report No. 91 of the Royal Commission: The settlement of which will be allowed to remain in abeyance until some more suitable time. but which shall not prevent the Government of the Province from dealing with vacant Crown lands under the provisions of the land laws of the Province from time to time in force and effect. The Minister further states that, to ensure uniformity, the Royal Commission was requested to extend to
the Railway Belt their examination into the needs of the
Indians for reserves in that portion of British Columbia,
and to make recommendations; that the work was accordingly
carried out and their report and recommendations are to be
found in the general report on Indian Reserves throughout
the Province.

As the lands in the Railway Belt are under the sole jurisdiction of the Dominion, the Minister recommends that the findings of the Rayal Commission with reference to reserves within the Railway Belt be confirmed, but that no reduction or cut-off be made in the areas of the reserves, as recommended by the said Royal Commission.

The Committee concur in the foregoing recommendation and submit the same for approval.

THE GOVERNMENT OF THE PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Certified copy of a minute of the monourable The Executive Council, Approved by His monour The Leutenant-Governor on the 29th Day of July, A.D., 1938.

TO HIS HONCUR

THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR in Council:

The undersigned has the honour to recommend: THAT under authority of Section 93 of the "Land Act", being Chapter 144, "Revised Statutes of British Columbia, 1936", and Section 2 of Chapter 32, "British Columbia Statutes, 1919", being the "Indian Affairs Settlement Act", the lands set out in schedule attached hereto be conveyed to His Majesty the King in the right of the Dominion of Canada in trust for the use and benefit of the Indians of the Province of British Columbia, subject, however, to the right of the Dominion Government to deal with the said lands in such a manner as they may doem best suited for the purpose of the Indians including a right to sell the said lands and fund or use the proceeds for the benefit of the Indiana subject to the condition that in the event of any Indian tribe or band in British Columbia at some future time becoming extinct that any lands hereby conveyed for such tribe or band, and not sold or disposed of as heretofore provided, or any unexpended fund being the proceeds of any such sale, shall be conveyed or repaid to the grantor, and that such conveyance shall also be subject to the following provisions:

PROVIDED NEVERTHELESS that it shall at all times be lawful for Us, Gur heirs and successors, or fer any person or persons acting in that behalf by Gur of their authority, to vasume any part of the said lands which it may be deemed necessary to resume for making roads, canals, bridges, towing paths, or other works of public utility or convenience; so, nevertheless that the lands so to be resumed shall not exceed the whole of the lands aforesaid, and that no such resumption shall be made of any law son which any buildings may have been erected, or which any buildings may have been erected, or which any sea gardens or otherwise for the more convenient occupation of any such buildings:

PROVIDED also that it shall be lawful for any person duly authorized in that behalf by Us, Our neirs and successors, to take and occupy such water privileges, and to have and enjoy such rights of carrying water over, through or under any parts of the hereditaments hereby granted, as may be reasonably required for mining or agricultural purposes in the vicinity of the said hereditaments, paying therefor a reasonable compensation;

PROVIDED ALSO that the Department of Indian Affairs shall through its proper officers be advised of any work contemplated under the preceding provisees that plans of the location of such work shall be furnished for the information of the Department of Indian Affairs, and that a reasonable time shall be allowed for consideration of the said plans and for any necessary adjustments or arrangements in connection with the proposed work:

PROVIDED also that it shall be at all times lawful for any person duly authorized in that behalf by Us, Our heirs and successors, to take from or upon any part of the hereditaments hereby granted, any gravel, and, stone, line, timber or other material which may be required in the construction, maintenance, or repair of any roads, ferries, bridges, or other public works. But nevertheless paying therefor reasonable compensation for such material as may be taken for use outside the boundaries of the hereditaments hereby granted:

PROVIDED also that all travelled streets, roads, trails, and other highways existing over or through said lands at the date hereof shall be excepted from this grant.

AND TO FURTHER RECOMMEND THAT A certified copy of this minute, if approved, be transmitted to the Registrar in each Land Registry Office in the Province of British Columbia to the intent that such certified copy be accepted by him as a conveyance of the said land to his Majesty the King in the right of the Dominion of Canada as represented by the Department of indian Affairs of Canada, without further formal instrument of transfer subject to the said provisoes and conditions.

AND TO FURTHER RECOMMEND THAT A certified copy of this minute, if approved, be forwarded to the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs at Ottawa.

EMERRIS title to Transpoon Indian Reserve, in the Province of Britich Columbia is vested in Her Hajesty in right of Canada for the use and benefit of the Tsavensson Eand of Indians;

AND WHEREAS Tensmasson Indian Reserve fronts on the waters of the Strait of Georgia and the original survey of the said reserve made in 1881 fixed the water-front boundary of the said reserve as ordinary high water mark of the Strait of Georgia as of the date of survey:

AND WHEREAS there has been an accretion of land in front of part of the 1881 waterfront boundary, said accretion containing by survey approximately 189 acres;

AND THERRAD the Doputy Attorney General of Canada advises that the accreted land is vested in Her Majesty in right of Canada and is under the control and administration of the Minister of Citisonship and Immigration, but does not form part of the said reserve;

AMD WHEREAS it is desirable that the accreted land as hereinafter described be set apart for the use and benefit of the Transmission Band of Indians as an addition to Transmission Indian Reserve.

THEREFORE, His Excellency the Administrator in Council, on the recommendation of the Minister of Citisenchip and Immigration, pursuant to the Indian Act, is pleased hereby to set apart for the use and benefit of the Toawenson Band of Indians in the Province of British Columbia, the land described hereunder, as an addition to Tsawenson Indian Reserve.

Description

In the Province of British Columbia, in the District of New Mestminster, all that accretion adjoining Tsawwessen Indian Reserve being district lot number one hundred and sixty-nine, group two,

Doar Sirs:

Reference is made to our telephone conversation at which time you requested the writer to outline the Department's position in respect to naturally accreted land.

The English Law Act, being Chapter 129 of the Revised Statutes of British Columbia, 1960, confirms that the Common Law of England shall apply in British Columbia unless specifically modified or altered by legislation having force in the Province. The common law rights of an owner of land fronting on a body of water are referred to as riparian rights. Some of these rights have in fact been extinguished by law but the riparian right to land formed by natural accretion has not been modified or altered by legislation.

Having established that a riparian land owner in British Columbia has a right to lands formed by natural accretion, the omus is on the upland owner to prove that the lands in question are in fact a natural accretion and thence to take the steps proscribed by law to establish title thereto.

You will appreciate that there have been several classic court cases in which the Supreme Court of Canada has ruled that the formation of the land was such that the new land did not accrue to the upland owner. In the case of the Attorney-General of British Columbia vs. Neilson (1956) S.C.R. 819, it was held that the land in dispute was not an accretion to the fee lands of the petitioner but rather a widespread emergence of land owned by the Crown, namely, the bed of the river.

You must also be aware that in Sir Matthew Hale's treatise "Do Jure Maris" as it appears in Hargraves Law Tracts at Page 12 dealing with the King's right of property on the shore, it is said:

"The shore is that ground that is between the ordinary high-water and low-water mark. This doth prima facie and of common right bolong to the King, both in the shore of the sea and the shore of arms of the sea."

It therefore follows that the shore of a body of water cannot be claimed as accretion by the upland owner.

Accretion has been defined in "Wharton's Law Lexicon," page 12, as follows:

"The act of growing to a thing; usually applied to the gradual imperceptible accumulation of land out of the sea or river. Accretion is of two kinds: alluvion, i.e., by the washing up of sand or soil, so as to form firm ground; or by dereliction as when the sea shrinks below the usual water mark. If this accretion of land be by small and imperceptible degrees, it belongs to the owner of the land immediately adjacent to it, in accordance with the maxim De minimis con curate Lex (the law cares not about trifles), but if it be sudden and considerable it belongs to the Crown."

...

These points are respectfully drawn to your attention to emphasize that the mere filing of a survey plan in the Land Registry office, of a parcel of unsurveyed land in front of the upland owner's fee lands would not be acceptable for the purpose of establishing title thereto.

Under the provisions of the "Land Registry Act" no title passes under an instrument until that instrument is registered and, furthermore the granter must first be registered as an owner before he is in a position to convey. It therefore follows that no grant by a subject of land acquired by accretion could be registered until the granter first obtains a registered title. Since, moreover, the doctrine of accretion depends upon evidence showing the course and progress of the change in the bed of the body of water, it is obvious that a riparian owner claiming such title cannot obtain registration by the mere asking. The register can only be rectified to include the additional land either by an Order of the Court, in which proceedings the Crown Provincial must be a part or by an agreement between the riparian owner and the Crown Provincial based upon an accurate survey of the present natural boundary.

In British Columbia provision has been made for establishing title to natural accretions either through Section 102(2) of the Land Registry Act or by petitioning the Supreme Court of British Columbia under the provisions of the Quieting Titles Act, being Chapter 327 of the R.S.B.C., 1960.

The seaward extent of any natural accretion would require delineation on the ground of the natural boundary by a B. C. Land Surveyor. Natural boundary has been defined in Section 2(n) of the Land Act, being Chapter 17 of the S.B.C., 1970, as

"The visible high-water mark of any lake, river, stream, or other body of water where the presence and action of the water are so common and usual, and so long continued in all ordinary years, as to mark upon the soil of the bed of the lake, river, stream, or other body of water a character distinct from that of the banks thereof, in respect to vegetation, as well as in respect to the nature of the soil itself."

In conclusion I would state that there is nothing to prevent a riparian owner from acquiring title to a natural accretion abutting his fee lands after it has been proven that the lands in question are a true accretion.

That by a resurvey of the waterfront of the reserve in 1964-1965 by I.H.D. Fox, B.C.L.S., and recorded as Plan No. 53052 in the Canada Lands Surveys Records, Ottawa, an accretion in front of the reserve, containing eight acres and sixty-four hundredths of an acre, more or less, is shown as Parcel "D" on the said plan;

That by virtue of an opinion by the Deputy Attorney General of Canada in 1961, such an accretion, while the property of Her Majesty in right of Canada, is not vested in Her Majesty for the use and benefit of the Indian Band concerned; and

- 32. (1) An application for a disposition by purchase, lease or licence of occupation in the form specified by the minister, together with the application fee, must be made to the commissioner of the land recording district where the land is located.
- (2) If the application complies with this Act and the regulations and has been accepted, the commissioner must retain one copy for his or her records and post one copy in his or her office.
 - (3) If the land is unsurveyed or if no evidence of survey is available, the applicant must
 - (a) before making the application, fix securely in the ground, at one corner of the land to be applied for, a squared post or squared tree, at least 1 m above the ground level, and securely attach to the post or tree a written notice in the form specified by the minister of the applicant's intention to make an application for a disposition of the land described in the notice, and
 - (b) with the application, provide the proof of the posting of the notice as required by the minister.
 - (3.1) The minister may waive compliance with subsection (3).
 - (4) Subsection (3) does not apply to
 - (a) a licence of occupation for a year or less, or
 - (b) a grant of right of way or easement.

- 33. (1) If the minister considers it advisable in the public interest, the minister may require the applicant to publish a notice of his or her application.
 - (2) The notice must
 - (a) be headed "Land Act: Notice of Intention to Apply for a Disposition of Crown Land",
 - (b) state the land recording district and location of the land,
 - (c) state the applicant's address and occupation,
 - (d) state the purpose for which the land is required,
 - (e) be signed by the applicant or his or her agent, and
 - (f) give notice that the named applicant intends to apply for specific land or land described in relation to the post, of a named area, more or less.
- (3) The applicant must publish the notice in the Gazette or a newspaper circulating in the land recording district where the land is located, or in both, for the number of issues and within the period required by the minister.
 - (4) The applicant must provide proof of publication of the notice.





and seems to have solved the head-on collision problem in that area. Riprapping along the Squamish and Lillooet Rivers and rock stabilization at Porteau along Highway 99 was again under way. In excess of 30 miles of road were paved throughout the district.

Buildings

Construction of two new salt sheds and improvements to existing yards were completed. A new yard-site at Alta Lake is progressing to handle the expanding area of Whistler.

NEW WESTMINSTER DISTRICT

Roads

Maintenance—Highways throughout the district were, in general, maintained to a high standard commensurate with traffice needs and æsthetic considerations. During the spring and summer months, grass-mowing continued to be a major item. The beautification programme continued this year, with many trees planted along the median of Trans-Canada Highway 1.

An extensive resurfacing programme reduced the amount of pavement maintenance, which had become quite excessive on home highway sections that were yielding to the effects of a fairly severe winter and heavy traffic volumes. A continuing programme of surface-treating shoulders should help to reduce shoulder maintenance, especially on Trans-Canada Highway 1, where gravel shoulders require heavy maintenance and grading is an involved procedure because of the high-speed traffic.

Brush control is mainly undertaken by hand labour or by machine where possible. The use of chemicals for this purpose is quite limited.

Snow removal—Being a very mild winter this year, very few problems of any significance were experienced with respect to snow removal and salting operations. The average recorded snowfall for this district was about 19 inches total.

Construction

Some construction programmes in the district were quite extensive this year; the largest day-labour project being the widening of Tsawwassen Highway 17 to four lanes from 56th Street to Deas Throughway, Highway 99. This is a continuing project that will run through 1973.

Other major projects included the reconstruction of 2.5 miles of Aldergrove—Bellingham Highway 13 from Bertrand Creek to the International Boundary, the revising of the intersection of King George VI Highway 99A and Fraser Highway 1A, as well as widening to four lanes King George VI Highway to 96th Avenue, and the reconstruction of half a mile of Bedwell Bay Road in the area of Sasamat Lake.

A large drainage project involving storm-sewering a section of ditch on Pacific Highway in Surrey, between 16th Avenue and 20th Avenue, was completed as well as some piping of ditches in the area of 12th Avenue to provide safer shoulders and overcome erosion problems.

Channelization work started last year was completed at the intersection of Scott Road at 72nd Avenue, at Scott Road and 96th Avenue in Surrey, and at Lougheed Highway and 240th Street in Maple Ridge.

Channelization and an improved right-turn lane were completed on Canada Way at Kensington Street in Burnaby.

With the introduction of an improved bus system in the Coquitlam-Burnaby area, the district undertook the construction of some 40 bus pull-out bays at various locations on Lougheed Highway 7 and Ioco Road.

The tree-planting programme continued with further plantings on Trans-Canada Highway 1 and some planting around yard-sites.

Snow removal—The winter was quite mild this year and problems associated with snow removal were minimal.

The average recorded snowfall for the district was approximately 27 inches total.

Construction—Except for final lift of pavement, work was completed on the widening of Highway 17 to four lanes. In conjunction with the Knight Street Bridge project, the district undertook, by day labour, the construction of a 1-mile extension of Knight Street between Cambie Road and Westminster Highway. Other major projects included the reconstruction of Highway 13 County Line Road between Fraser Highway 1A and Trans-Canada Highway 1 in Langley, and the replacement of Government Bridge and School Bridge on Ioco Road with culverts and fill.

Work continued on the overpass approach fills on the Stormont Interchange to Lougheed Highway connection in Burnaby.

Some smaller projects included the construction of a road to Turtle Head in the Belcarra area, shoulder widening on Sunnyside Road, addition of a lane on the Johnston Interchange offramp from Trans-Canada Highway 1, and a right-turn lane on Pacific Highway 15 at the weigh scale north of the International Boundary.

Started, but not completed this year, for the University Endowment Lands at UBC, the district undertook the extension of Western Parkway and installed curb and gutter.

Drainage projects included the installation of 1 mile of storm sewer on Pacific Highway 15, between 24th and 32nd Avenues, to provide safer shoulders and resolve major erosion problem.

On Southwest Marine Drive, at UBC, 900 feet of storm sewer were installed to enclose a ditch east of University Boulevard.

Traffic signals continue to be much in demand, installations were completed on Fraser Highway 1A at 208th Street in Langley, on Sea Island Way at Sexsmith Road in Richmond, on Highway 10 at Scott Road in Surrey, on Scott Road at 80th Avenue in Surrey, on King George VI Highway 99A at 64th Avenue in Surrey, on Lougheed Highway 7 at 207th Street and at 216th Street in Maple Ridge, and on Knight Street at Cambie Road in Richmond. Also, a pedestrian traffic signal was installed on Lougheed Highway 7 at Hastings Street in Port Coquitlam.

Bridges

Little major work was undertaken on structures in the district this year. Apart from the resurfacing of the concrete deck on Johnston Underpass on Trans-Canada Highway 1 and joint repairs to the Burlington Northern Overpass on Highway 99 and to the Oak Street Bridge, most of the work consisted of routine maintenance.

Ferries

Operation of both the Albion ferry and the Barnston Island ferry went without incident this year. Traffic volumes continued to remain high at the Albion-Fort Langley ferry. Rebuilding of the landings to accommodate a larger vessel is planned for next year.

ENGINEERING

DESIGN AND SURVEYS BRANCH

The Design and Surveys Branch worked on 214 projects during the year, representing 1370 km of two, four, and five lane highways. In December 1987 the Branch was reorganized to include Planning, Traffic, and Electrical Sections and became the Traffic and Design Branch.

Although capital construction and design projects declined in 1987-88, the Environmental Services Section group carried out continuing environmental impact and mitigation studies on major projects such as the Okanagan Connector, Howe Sound, and Annacis Crossing project.

Heritage and archaeology studies were directed towards the Vancouver Island Highway. Highway 16, and Highway 17. A coastal midden site was successfully salvaged at Tsawwassen.

At the request of the Canadian International Development Agency, assistance was provided by staff to the Government of Indonesia's Ministry of Public Works in developing an environmental program for transportation and water resource projects.

Habitat conservation sites and monitoring programs were developed for the Chehalis River, Cambie-Malakwa, and Annacis area. The program to reduce wildlife vehicle collisions continued.

During the year the sound control studies section's efforts were concentrated in the Coquihalla, Lower Mainland, and Vancouver Island areas. In the Lower Mainland, projects included drafting the Ministry's response to BC Transit's proposal for mitigating SkyTrain's noise impact. On Vancouver Island, several potential noise impact assessments were done at the request of resident groups after announcement of a route corridor for the Inland Island Highway.

Because Phase III of the Coquihalla Highway might result in pollution of Peachland's water supply, it was necessary for the Ministry to provide Peachland with an alternative water source. Design and construction of the proposed works was completed during 1987.

The Bridge Branch was provided with hydraulic perimeters for ten projects, and specialist advice was provided to regional staff throughout the Province and in assessing drainage problems on proposed subdivisions.

The expansion of computer programs to regional operations got underway with the introduction of engineering workstations across the province. The new Eclipse Engineering System will be placed in field survey locations for the second stage of testing.

Preliminary studies involve studies at different levels of detail, and are carried out prior to a ground survey. Four studies, representing about 125 km of highway were completed, and two studies started the previous year were finished. Seventeen preliminary studies are continuing.

GEOTECHNICAL AND MATERIALS ENGINEERING

Geotechnical and materials engineering services were provided to all Ministry branches from offices and laboratories in Victoria, Burnaby, and each of the six regions. The operating budget for the year totalled \$11.3 million, and a staff of 201 full time equivalents carried out the work of the branch.

Compared to the previous two years, investigation and testing work activity levels were somewhat lower. Functionally, the services were in support of highway and bridge design

North Vancouver, Upper Levels Highway: Replaced congested at-grade, signalized Lonsdale Intersection with a safer and higher capacity interchange. Part of long-range plan to upgrade Trans Canada Highway to freeway standard.

Surrey, Scott Road: Replaced the interconnection at King George Highway with a safer and higher capacity interchange to better access Scott Road Sky Train Station and parking facilities.

North Vancouver, Dollarton Highway: Reconstructed 6.1 km to improve road to a modern, urban standard.

Delta, Nordel Way Extension: Constructed 9 km of four-lane road. Part of commitment to meet the needs of expanding population using the Alex Fraser Bridge.

Langley, 200th Street, 64th Ave. to 72nd Ave.: Continuing to improve safety and carrying capacity by widening to four lanes plus left-turn lanes at intersections.

Chilliwack area, Trans Canada Highway: Three new interchanges to improve public safety with the elimination of at-grade crossings. Part of long-range plan to upgrade Trans Canada Highway to freeway standard.

Sunshine Coast, Secret Cove, Highway 101: Upgraded 2.7 km to improve horizontal/vertical alignment for safety and travelling efficiency. Continuation of Highway 101 upgrading program.

Delta, Tsawwassen Highway 17: Causeway being widened to four lanes with additional eastbound lane to 56th Street (4.7 km). Intersections at 52nd Street and 56th Street will be signalized.

Delta/Richmond, Massey Tunnel: Electronic counterflow installed in both tubes to provide three lanes of traffic northbound in the morning and three lanes southbound in the afternoon. Extra lane handles approximately 1,400 vehicles every hour and improves flow of rush-hour traffic.

New Westminster/Surrey, Pattullo Bridge: Pier and concrete girder repairs and bearing replacement plus seismic restraining ties at Piers 17 and 18 of the south viaduct spans. Other aspects of this major rehabilitation project will continue over eight years.

We are attaching, hereto, a key map showing the proposed road connecting the Deas Tunnel Freeway and the Tsawwassen Ferry Landing.

Section "A" from the Ladner Interchange to the Ladner Trunk Road has already been constructed.

The remaining section "B", a distance of 5.25 miles, is required to be constructed to give the most desirable and most direct access to the ferry from the freeway.

We recommend the entire Section "B" be constructed at this time rather than attempt to send ferry traffic through the Village of Ladner via the existing road for by using the existing road we feel a hazardous traffic condition would result.


Ferry traffic behaves abnormally since it attempts to disperse or "spread out" in the first few miles of highway leading from the terminal. Consequently, passing or attempts to pass are frequent. The narrow standard of the existing road and the existence of at least two dangerous corners, suggest the possibility of serious accidents under these conditions. Congestion would also result in the Village of Ladner at peak periods.

The new proposal will provide a safe and direct connection to the major highway, and should attract to the use of the ferry system because of the ease of travel.
