
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Maps of location of Pembina operations as required for an application of a Railway Certificate from the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure in Victoria, British Columbia.

ISSUE:

Order in Council - Hours of Service - B.C. motion picture industry

RECOMMENDED OPTION:

Approve Order.

BACKGROUND:

When the Hours of Service (HOS) regulations were introduced in 2007, ministry staff met with representatives from the motion picture industry (the Industry) and made a commitment to explore regulatory changes that would provide an exemption for that Industry from the HOS regulations. Further discussions occurred in 2010 and 2012, but no agreement was reached that would allow for an exemption to be granted.

In June 2016, CVSE formed a working group composed of representatives from CVSE, the Industry and CreativeBC to discuss issues related to compliance with the province's National Safety Code regulations, and the need to work together to find solutions that protect the safety of workers while not impeding the vibrancy of the industry.



ISSUE:

Signing of the "2018/19 BC Transit Capital Contribution Agreement" and

"BC-BC Transit Amending Agreement No. 2 for the Public Transit Infrastructure

Fund".

SUMMARY:

The Province and BC Transit enter into an annual Capital Contribution Agreement (CCA) that outlines approved Provincial capital funding and lays out the responsibilities and obligations of each party in the delivery of capital projects delivered by BC Transit under the "traditional funding formula" with no federal funding.

- The Province and BC Transit have also entered into an agreement that outlines Provincial funding and lays out the responsibilities and obligations of each party in the delivery of capital projects under the federal government's Public Transit Infrastructure Fund.
- Both agreements require executive signoff on behalf of the Provincial government:
 - 2018/19 BC Transit Capital Contribution Agreement: The most recent capital contribution agreement expired on March 31, 2018 and following significant negotiations, the Ministry and BC Transit have developed an updated agreement a) reflecting new ministry policy on invoice documentation, and b) removing the ability of BC Transit to charge MOTI for "Interest During Construction" (IDC).
 - Amending Agreement No. 2 for the Public Transit Infrastructure Fund: The proposed amendment includes changes to a) align project reporting requirements with other agreements, and b) to remove the ability of BC Transit to charge MOTI for "Interest During Construction" (IDC).

DISCUSSION:

Capital Contribution Agreement

The Province provides operating and capital contributions to BC Transit to fund its share of transit operating and capital costs. The Province and BC Transit enter into operating and capital contribution agreements that outline the funding and formally lay out the responsibilities and obligations of each party regarding the provision of public transit.

The most recent capital contribution agreement expired March 31, 2018, and the proposed agreement covers a one-year term from April 1, 2018 to March 31, 2019. The agreement outlines the cost-sharing percentages for the Province and local governments, and it lays out a schedule for the Province to reimburse BC Transit for its share of capital costs on a quarterly basis. As with the operating contribution agreement, the capital agreement specifies requirements for reporting and communication between BC Transit and the Province.

There are two significant changes in this new agreement:

- An increase in the level of detail required to be submitted by BC Transit when invoicing the Ministry, reflecting new ministry policy on invoice documentation; and,
- Removal of BC Transit's ability to charge MOTI for "Interest During Construction" (IDC).

BC - BC Transit Amending Agreement No. 2 for the Public Transit Infrastructure Fund

The Province and BC Transit have entered into an agreement that outlines Provincial funding and lays out the responsibilities and obligations of each party in the delivery of capital projects under the federal government's Public Transit Infrastructure Fund. This Agreement is in accordance with the specifications of the "Canada – British Columbia Bilateral Agreement on the Public Transit Infrastructure Fund".

There are two significant changes in this amendment:

- Amending the reporting dates to more closely align with MOTI reporting requirements; and,
- Removal of BC Transit's ability to charge MOTI for "Interest During Construction" (IDC).

(collectively referred to as the Parties)

WHEREAS:

- A. The Ministry has an interest in the provision of an efficient public transit system and BC Transit, a provincial crown agency, is charged with coordinating the delivery of public passenger transportation throughout British Columbia (outside Metro Vancouver).
- B. BC Transit will provide transit services by acquiring, operating, servicing, maintaining, and repairing all assets acquired in accordance with this Agreement, as per appropriate standards, over the Asset Useful Life.
- C. The BC Transit Capital Program is made up of two distinct components:
 - (a) Investments to maintain the existing transit vehicle fleet and related assets, which may include major overhaul and/or rehabilitation of existing assets or replacement of assets that have exceeded their economic life ("Capital Replacement"); and
 - (b) Investments to expand the transit system, increase ridership and market share, ensure business continuity and reduce transportation related greenhouse gases emissions, which may include bus fleet expansion, maintenance facilities, rapid transit, technology and other supportive infrastructure and system expansion ("Other Capital").

D. The Parties will coordinate efforts to ensure the promotion and communication of all investments made under this Agreement, emphasizing the funding partnerships and benefits to transit users and regional transit systems.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and the covenants contained in this Agreement, the parties agree as follows:

1. Definitions

1.1 In this Agreement:

"Asset Category" means the following groupings of Capital Replacement assets: Facilities; Equipment; IT/Security; Vehicle Acquisition-Non Revenue; Vehicle Acquisition-High Capacity; Vehicle Acquisition-Heavy Duty; Vehicle Acquisition-Medium Duty; Vehicle Acquisition-Light Duty; and Vehicle Refurbishment/Refit;

"Asset Useful Life" means BC Transit's estimate of the period of time over which an asset would reasonably be expected to be used to provide services;

"Business Case" means a business case prepared by BC Transit in accordance with CAMF and Treasury Board requirements;

"CAMF" means the Capital Asset Management Framework describing the government's objectives and policies for planning and managing publicly-funded capital assets, as published on the website of the Ministry of Finance;

"Capital Expenditures" means any expenditures that BC Transit has incurred and reasonably accounted for as capital expenditures in accordance with public sector accounting standards, but excluding (i) any goods, real property, or services received through donations in kind, (ii) any taxes or costs for which BC Transit is eligible for a rebate, (iii) financing charges, and (iv) interest during construction (IDC);

"Communications Products" means communications plans, event plans, news releases, service advisories, invitation lists, invitations, graphics and media advisories;

"Capital Replacement" has the meaning given to it in Recital C (a);

"FAA" means the Financial Administration Act;

"Fiscal Year" means the period from April 1 in one year to March 31 in the next year;

"Funds" means the funds made available by the Ministry pursuant to this Agreement;

"ICIP Projects" means both Capital Replacement and Other Capital funded under the federal Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program and delivered by BC Transit under the British Columbia-BC Transit Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program Ultimate Recipient Agreement dated for reference November 27, 2018.

"Other Capital" has the meaning given to it in Recital C (b); and

"Net Book Value" means the cost of a tangible capital asset, less both accumulated amortization and the amount of any write-downs;

"Project" means a Capital Replacement project or an Other Capital project as identified in Schedule C, for which Funds have been approved, but excludes ICIP Projects and PTIF Projects; and

"PTIF Projects" means both Capital Replacement and Other Capital funded under the federal Public Transit Infrastructure Fund and delivered by BC Transit under the British Columbia-BC Transit Public Transit Infrastructure Fund Contribution Agreement dated for reference December 14, 2016, as amended.

2. Schedules

2.1 The following Schedules are attached to and form part of this Agreement;

Schedule A - Report Due Dates: Lists the dates by which reports indicated under Section 5 are due to the Ministry.

Schedule B – BC Transit Capital and Major Operating Projects Report: Provides an overview of Projects with a budget greater than \$5 million, or assessed by BC Transit as having a high risk profile, including itemized schedules, budgets and cash flow, together with explanations of variances from original plans and estimates.

Schedule C – Budget Submission Form: Lists planned Projects for the 2018/19 Fiscal Year, including Capital Replacement by Asset Category and Other Capital by Project name, together with budgeted Funds by funding source and, for the current Fiscal Year, by quarter.

Schedule D — Partner Cost Sharing Percentages: Indicates capital cost sharing percentages for the Ministry and local governments.

3. Effective Date and Term

- 3.1 Notwithstanding the date of execution and delivery of this Agreement, the term of this Agreement will commence on April 1, 2018, and end on March 31, 2019, unless terminated or amended in accordance with Section 12.
- 3.2 This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and no understanding, representations or agreements, oral or otherwise, exist between the Parties with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement except as expressly set out or incorporated by reference to this Agreement.

4. Contribution Payments

4.1 BC Transit will, in accordance with this Agreement and not less frequently than after the end of each quarter, invoice the Ministry for reimbursement of the Ministry's share of Capital Expenditures on Projects. BC Transit's invoices will provide total Capital Expenditures by Asset Category for Capital Replacement Projects or by Project name for Other Capital Projects and will include copies of supporting invoices and documentation acceptable to the Province for all expenditures equal to or greater than \$50,000. The Ministry will make reasonable efforts to pay invoices within 30 days of receipt.

- 4.2 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, payments by the Ministry to BC Transit pursuant to this Agreement are subject to:
 - 4.2.1 There being sufficient monies available in an appropriation, as defined in the FAA, to enable the Ministry in any Fiscal Year when any payment of money by the Ministry falls due pursuant to this Agreement, to make that payment;
 - 4.2.2 Treasury Board, as defined in the FAA, not having controlled or limited, pursuant to the FAA, expenditure under such appropriation; and
 - 4.2.3 BC Transit having met each quarterly reporting requirement listed in Section 5 and Schedule A of this Agreement (the eligibility criteria).
- 4.3 Subject to sections 4.3.1 and 4.3.2, the Ministry's share of Capital Expenditures will be calculated by applying the appropriate percentage as outlined in Schedule D.
 - 4.3.1 For Capital Expenditures supporting paratransit service, the appropriate percentage will be a blended rate based on the proportionate share of conventional transit service and custom transit service for the corresponding transit system.
 - 4.3.2 The Parties will amend the cost sharing percentages outlined in Schedule D when third party funding is available.
- 4.4 BC Transit will ensure that the Ministry's cumulative invoicing does not exceed the Funds as indicated on Schedule C.

5. Reporting

- In order to support the Ministry's budget management and approval process, by no later than October 30th of each year (date subject to change based on Budget and Service Plan submission deadlines), BC Transit will provide a draft Schedule C for the subsequent three Fiscal Years. Each new investment proposed for the first Fiscal Year will be supported by a Business Case or, if a Business Case is not finalized, a draft Business Case or other supporting documentation (studies etc.), which BC Transit will provide to the Ministry on request.
- 5.2 BC Transit will provide to the Ministry the following reports by the dates indicated on Schedule A:
 - 5.2.1 Quarterly Financial Statements and Financial Projections for Treasury Board Staff:
 - 5.2.2 Quarterly Financial Statements and Financial Projections for the Comptroller General:
 - 5.2.3 Forecast current year cash flows for Projects listed in Schedule C by partner and by guarter based on current projections; and
 - 5.2.4 Capital and Major Operating Projects Report (Schedule B).
- 5.3 All reports submitted in relation to this Agreement are to be approved by the Chief Financial Officer of BC Transit.

6. Communications

- 6.1 The Ministry and BC Transit agree to develop a Communications Protocol that will outline how communications activities are administered on capital projects funded in part by the Ministry. The protocol will:
 - 6.1.1 Provide for BC Transit and the Ministry to work jointly to produce Communications products;
 - 6.1.2 Provide clarity to BC Transit and the Ministry on their roles and responsibilities in developing and implementing Communications products; and
 - 6.1.3 Establish communication requirements outlined in agreements with other funding agencies.

7. Use and Reallocation of Funds

- 7.1 Any Funds contributed to BC Transit under this Agreement have the following stipulations:
 - 7.1.1 BC Transit will use the Funds solely to undertake the Projects listed in Schedule C of this Agreement;
 - 7.1.2 The assets acquired with the Funds will be owned by BC Transit, unless agreed otherwise by the Parties in writing, and will be used to deliver ongoing regional transportation services to support BC Transit's service delivery mandate over the Asset Useful Life;
 - 7.1.3 BC Transit will conduct regular inspections of the condition of the assets, will service, maintain, and keep the assets in good condition and repair, having regard to their age, and will provide all services, materials, goods, supplies and parts necessary to safely and effectively maintain the assets in accordance with appropriate standards; and
 - 7.1.4 By using the assets to deliver regional transportation services, BC Transit will satisfy its obligation to the Province on a systematic basis over the Asset Useful Life.
- 7.2 BC Transit will have discretion to reallocate Funds received under this Agreement for Projects relating to Capital Replacement between Asset Categories to meet unforeseen repair and/or replacement requirements.
- 7.3 BC Transit will not reallocate Funds received under this Agreement for Projects relating to Other Capital without prior written approval from the Ministry.

8. Retirement or Disposal of Assets

- 8.1 This section is only applicable to assets owned by BC Transit.
- 8.2 If, at any time during the Asset Useful Life, BC Transit voluntarily permanently discontinues using the assets acquired by Funds under this Agreement for ongoing

- regional transportation services, BC Transit will, for those assets that are no longer used to provide regional transportation services, remit to the Ministry its proportionate share of any monetary proceeds upon disposal, based on the percentage of Ministry funding for acquisition of the asset.
- 8.3 The Ministry may, at its sole discretion, direct BC Transit to retain the repayment or gain amount as an externally restricted amount for future Ministry approved capital projects.
- 8.4 The requirements set out in sections 8.1 through 8.3 above are consistent with the intent and implications of previous capital contribution agreements between the Ministry and BC Transit, including for capital contributions issued as a prepaid capital advance.

9. Records and Audit

9.1 BC Transit will establish and maintain accurate books of accounts and records, including supporting documents, of all costs incurred and monies paid in connection with assets acquired under this Agreement, and will permit the Ministry at any time or times during normal business hours to copy or audit, or both, any or all of such books or account and records, including supporting documents.

10. Indemnification

10.1 BC Transit will at all times indemnify and save harmless Her Majesty the Queen in Right of the Province of British Columbia, and it's employees, servants, and agents, from and against all claims, actions, causes of action, demands, losses, damages, costs, liabilities, expenses, fines, fees, penalties, assessments and levies, made against or incurred, suffered or sustained by any of them, at any time or times (whether such interest, fines or costs are court ordered or otherwise and whether before or after the expiration or termination of this Agreement) where the same or any of them are sustained in any way as a result of this Agreement, which indemnity will survive the expiration or sooner termination of this Agreement.

11. Dispute Resolution

- 11.1 If any dispute arises under this Agreement, the parties will attempt to resolve the dispute collaboratively at a staff level within 60 days of the dispute arising (or within such other time period agreed to by the parties) and, subject to applicable laws, provide candid and timely disclosure to each other of all relevant facts, information and documents to facilitate those efforts.
- 11.2 If a dispute cannot be resolved in accordance with section 11.1, executive members of each Party will meet to review and direct resolution of the matter.

12. Amending or Terminating the Agreement

12.1 This Agreement may only be amended, in writing, by mutual consent of the Ministry and BC Transit.

12.2 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, the Ministry may reduce funding or terminate this Agreement for any reason. The Ministry will give notice in writing to BC Transit as early as possible and offer to BC Transit a reasonable opportunity to work with the Ministry to negotiate a modification to BC Transit's capital plan. The Ministry's share of all costs incurred up to and including the termination date, as well as legally obligated costs, will be funded.

13. Notices

Any notice, consent, waiver, statement of other document that either party may desire or be required to give or deliver to the other will be deemed to have been validly given or delivered to and received by the addressee, if delivered personally on the date of delivery or, if mailed, on the 5th business day after the mailing of the same in Canada by prepaid post addressed:

14. General

- 14.1 Each of the Parties will, upon the reasonable request of the other, make, do, execute or cause to be made, done or executed all further and other lawful acts, deeds, things, devices, documents, instruments and assurances whatever for the better or more perfect and absolute performance of the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 14.2 Unless the context otherwise requires, any reference to "this Agreement" means this instrument and all of the schedules attached to it, and any references to any schedule, recital, article, section, subsection or paragraph by number or letter is a reference to the appropriate schedule, recital, article, section, subsection or paragraph in or attached to this Agreement.

- 14.3 In this Agreement, the words "including" and "includes", when following any general term or statement, are not to be construed as limiting the general term or statement to the specific terms or matters set forth or to similar items or matters, but rather as permitting the general term or statement to refer to all other items or matters that could reasonably fall within the broadest possible scope of the general terms or statement.
- 14.4 The headings appearing in this Agreement have been inserted for reference and as a matter of convenience and in no way define, limit or enlarge the scope of any provision of this Agreement.
- 14.5 No term or condition of this Agreement and no breach by either party of any such term or condition will be deemed to have been waived unless such waiver is in writing signed by the other party.
- 14.6 The written waiver of any breach of any term or condition of this Agreement will not be deemed a waiver of such term or condition or of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term or condition of this Agreement.
- 14.7 Where this Agreement references a statute, such reference is a reference to a statute of the Province of British Columbia unless otherwise stated, and includes every amendment to it, every regulation made under it, and any enactment passed in replacement or substitution for it.
- 14.8 This Agreement will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the Province of British Columbia.
- 14.9 Time will be of the essence of this Agreement.

ISSUE:

Coastal Ferry Amendment Act Order in Councils

SUMMARY:

Once the Coastal Ferry Amendment Act receives Royal Assent two OICs are required to: i) bring sections of the Act into force and ii) appoint under one of those sections two new government appointees on the Board of Directors for the

BC Ferry Authority.

BACKGROUND:

The Coastal Ferry Act establishes the BC Ferry Authority. The purpose of the Authority is to govern British Columbia Ferry Services Inc. and to appoint its Board of Directors. By its structure, the Authority ensures the operation of BC Ferries is independent from the provincial government.

The Coastal Ferry Amendment Act (Bill 25) was passed in the Spring 2019 Legislative session and is currently awaiting Royal Assent. This Bill was in response to the recommendations set out in the Coastal Ferry Services review, released in February, 2019.

One of the recommendations stated that the number of provincial appointments on the BC Ferry Authority Board be increased from two to four. These two additional appointments, Shona Anne Moore and Marvin Harold Shaffer will replace the two community-at-large members.

DISCUSSION:

Two OIC's of the Coastal Ferry Amendment Act will be required:


- Bring into force Section 2 which designates an increase in the BC Ferry Authority Directors appointed by government from 2 to 4 replacing the two directors currently appointed from the community-at-large with government appointees, and
- Section 4 establishes that the BC Ferry Authority may set the terms of a BC Ferry Services
 Director and the terms may not exceed 8 consecutive years.

Given sensitivities pertaining to BC Ferries governance, these two Director appointees will need to be appointed as soon as possible following Royal Assent. 
