Hi Doug

Regarding the works done in the ministry ditches, i asked the engineering firm that represented the regional district with the installation of the waterline in these ditches to remove all the works that was put in our ditches without permission.

The operations manager here( Bob O,Brien) wants the ditches to be free flowing, standing water as in the ditches right now because of these little rock groins saturate the road bed causing the asphalt to break up. The willows restrict ditch maintenance and grow to size that reduces the capacity of the diches, Atlas road carries large flows of water in the winter and the works that were done on the unopened portion of Hudson road if left unchanged will cause flooding this winter.

The large cross culvert at Hudson crossing Ryan has the outlet on the north side a foot up in the air from the ditch/stream grade that is recieving the water, so no fish can get accross the road to the ditches that these works have been done in. The fish would have to be planted in these ditches for them to become fish bearing.

If you want to get together to look at or discuss what should or shouldn,t stay i,d be happy to run any senerio,s we come up with by the ops manager.

I dont think anyone has gone out to remove anything yet, we were surprised to see these things in the ditches, i dont think the regional district asked anybody to install these things because they would also interfere with the waterline maintenance.

I dont know who decided to install these works but we would like to know if there are other areas or ditches where these things are going to pop up because they should be maintained by others and there may be liability issues.

Hello Gerry/Greg

I have been brought into the issue regarding the planting of vegetation along the ditch lines at the above location and most recently a report that the live stakes along Atlas/Hudson to Hudson Ryan have recently been removed by an unknown person(s). It should be noted that the ditch lines in this area are the headwaters of fish bearing streams, and these are areas that fish have direct access to. For this reason DFO does have concerns about this location. With the all development and increased amount of new ditching taking place in that area, there is a significant amount of water being discharged into those ditch lines. For this reason it is very important to ensure that these ditches are stable. I would like to know if anyone can shed some light on who may have removed the stakes in this area.

While I can understand the future maintenance concerns regarding these ditch lines and that MoT should have been consulted prior to this work, I am sure that we can work together to deal with those issues should the vegetation become a problem in the future.

I also note that there have been 3 incidences that I know of this spring regarding mowing of vegetation immediately adjacent and in fish bearing waters, all of which in my opinion are contrary to the *Fisheries Act*. One site even had a clearly marked sign showing that fish were present so our frustration is understandable.

I look forward to your response. Thank you.

Re: Additional right-of-way requirements
Ryan Road - Comox Airport.
Legal: Part of Lot 1, of Lot 239, Comox
District, Plan 2832.

With reference to our recent discussions, please find enclosed our location plan showing outlined in red, the area 2.27 acs., required for road. You will no doubt recall that 2.02 acs. of this area was taken for road back in 1959. Thus 0.25 acs is actually required at this time for addition widening.

Pursuant to the grant from the Crown and under provisions of the "Highway Act", the Department may resume for road purposes, an area up to, but not exceeding, one-twentieth of the total area of the parcel, and where same is unimproved, no compensation is payable.

In this instance your holding comprises 62.4 acs. and it will be observed that a total of 3.1 acs. is subject to statutory resumption. Since the total area of land required for road purposes is less than one-twentieth and being unimproved land, no compensation is payable.

The right-of-way will be established as a public Highway by notice in the British Columbia Gasette and a supporting notice will be filed with the Registrar of Titles to affect a notation on the registered title in the Land Registry Office, Victoria, British Columbia.
