Change Canada, regarding Elk Valley transboundary waters.

STRATEGIC CONSIDERATION AND MESSAGES:

- British Columbia (BC) continues to work with all parties to improve water quality in the Elk River Valley, without requiring the involvement of the International Joint Commission (IJC).
- The US Department of State continues to seek a joint reference on the Koocanusa reservoir to the IJC under the Canada-US Boundary Waters Treaty, and have shared draft language with Global Affairs Canada. The Ktunaxa Nations and State of Montana are both presently in support of the reference.
- Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) is proposing a federal Alternative
 Approach as a more efficient and effective alternative to an IJC reference. The approach lays
 out a path to meet the commitments outlined in a March 24 joint statement from President
 Biden and Prime Minister Trudeau for a collective response to improve water quality in the Elk
 River Valley.

SUMMARY:

- BC is undertaking a comprehensive approach to meaningfully address the water quality issues
 in the Elk River valley, including the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy
 initiating a process to review and update the Area-Based Management Plan (ABMP);
 strengthening regulatory requirements for Elk Valley mining operations, increasing
 transparency of data and information on water quality, monitoring and regulatory programs in
 the region; providing input into the federal government's proposed Coal Mining Effluent
 Regulation; and enhancing transboundary governance, coordination, and information sharing.
- BC continues to work closely with the Ktunaxa First Nations in Canada, in response to requests for their greater involvement in some of the important work in the territory.
- A draft and Selenium Water Quality Objective (WQO) for Koocanusa Reservoir, which was developed by BC and Ktunaxa Nation Council, will be a released for public comment as a first stage in the ABMP amendment process.
- U.S. agencies and Tribes, along with the federal government and industry, will be invited to participate in a multi-stakeholder technical advisory committee that will guide the ABMP amendment process.
- BC will continue to work with ECCC to provide input and support the federal Alternative Approach to an IJC reference to achieve the desired shared outcomes of improved water quality in the transboundary waters.

KEY MESSAGES:

International Joint Commission (IJC)

- The Province continues to work with all parties to improve water quality in the Elk River Valley without the involvement of the International Joint Commission (IJC).
- The March 24 joint statement from the President and Prime Minister confirms our desire for a
 collective approach to improve water quality in the Elk River Valley and does not reference the
 need for an IJC.

 Over the past number of years, we have engaged extensively with rights holders and stakeholders to fully understand their concerns and interests, to ensure provincial actions are responsive to these.

- The Province is undertaking a comprehensive approach which includes:
 - strengthening regulatory requirements for Elk Valley mining operations including updating permits to ensure that requirements are clear, enforceable and protective of the environment, and demonstrating provincial leadership in making amendments to the Area-Based Management Plan (ABMP) which will include completion of a new selenium water quality objective (WQO) for Koocanusa Reservoir;
 - increasing transparency of data and information on water quality, monitoring and regulatory programs in Southeast B.C. through the successful launch of a new Elk Valley Water Quality Hub website and planned ongoing refinements and additions;
 - providing input into the federal government's proposed Coal Mining Effluent Regulation; and
 - enhancing transboundary governance, coordination, and information sharing.
- The Province will make further improvements and enhancements to these initiatives should issues be identified that are not currently captured.

Area-Based Management Plan (ABMP) and Selenium Water Quality Objective (WQO)

- The Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy (ENV) has initiated the process to
 review and update the ABMP to address some of the challenges that have been identified
 through its early years of implementation and to ensure it remains relevant and reflective of the
 current situation. Work is now underway to retain a facilitator to assist us in scoping the
 amendment process and engagement strategy.
- The Province has been taking time to review this proposed project with the Ktunaxa First
 Nations in Canada, in response to requests for their greater involvement in some of the
 important work in the territory. This dialogue will continue the week of May 8th; we have
 follow-up meetings scheduled with at least two of the Ktunaxa Nations and have extended
 invitations to the other two nations and Ktunaxa Nation Council (KNC) leadership and staff.
- A draft selenium WQO for Koocanusa Reservoir, which was developed by ENV and KNC, will be a released for public comment as a first stage in this amendment process.
- U.S. agencies and Tribes, along with the federal government and industry, will be invited to participate in a multi-stakeholder technical advisory committee that will guide the ABMP amendment process.

KEY FACTS:

International Joint Commission (IJC)

- Over the past several decades metallurgical coal mining by Teck Coal Ltd. (and predecessors) in south-east B.C. (Elk Valley) has resulted in elevated levels of selenium (Se) and other mine-related contaminants in the Elk River watershed and Koocanusa Reservoir, which flows into Montana and Idaho.
- Concerns over selenium levels in the Elk River, Koocanusa reservoir, and the downstream
 Kootenai River have been raised by US state and federal agencies, stakeholders, and Indigenous
 Nations on both sides of the international border. There have been requests for an IJC reference
 on this issue.
- The IJC was created through the Boundary Waters Treaty of 1909. It was established to approve
 projects that affect water levels and flows across the boundary and to investigate transboundary
 issues and recommend solutions. The IJC was established by both countries because they
 recognized that each country is affected by the other's actions in lake and river systems along the
 border.

- Prime Minister Justin Trudeau wrote to former Premier John Horgan on November 9, 2022
 directing our two governments to work together with the Ktunaxa to find solutions.
- On March 24, a joint statement from the US President and the Canadian Prime Minister said:
 "Canada and the United States also intend to reach an agreement in principle by this summer to
 reduce and mitigate the impacts of water pollution in the Elk-Kootenay watershed, in partnership
 with Tribal Nations and Indigenous Peoples, and in order to protect the people and species that
 depend on this vital river system."

Area-Based Management Plan (ABMP) and Selenium Water Quality Objective (WQO)

- In 2013 and in response to growing water quality issues and concerns, a Ministerial Order under the *Environmental Management Act* required Teck to develop an ABMP to stabilize and reverse the trend of increasing water contaminants in the Elk River watershed.
- Since ABMP implementation began in 2014, Teck has invested heavily in the development of new treatment and other strategies to improve water quality (almost \$2B). Three major water treatment facilities are now operating with a fourth nearing completion and expected to come online this year.

- Record amounts of selenium and nitrate are now being removed from the watershed, and water quality is starting to stabilize downstream of treatment facilities.
- Given the emerging nature of the issues, there have been challenges and delays in achieving some
 of the water quality targets identified in the ABMP and new information has been learned about
 both the problem and the potential solutions.
- Updates to the ABMP are required to ensure it is reflective of the current situation, and
 responsive to new information and technological advancements. The province is now planning
 out an amendment process and efforts are underway to retain a facilitator to support the process.
- A draft selenium WQO for Koocanusa Reservoir has been co-developed by ENV and KNC. The
 draft WQO objective will be released as a first step in the ABMP amendment process. It is
 generally aligned with the current Montana selenium standard.
- When adopted, the selenium WQO would not be directly enforceable, but will inform a reassessment of the ABMP's selenium target.
- There is lots of pressure from the KNC, and US agencies and stakeholders, for B.C. to finish this
 work which has been carried out over many years as part of a larger bi-national collaborative
 process.
